For this reason, and taking into account the majority position held by youth in many countries, it is important to examine the role of governments in directing the Muslim youth population, and in particular how governments can work for them by providing sophisticated, comprehensive, and above all relevant education.

Building national integrity through enhancing the professionalism of youth leadership

Syamsul Rizal, STAIN, Bengkulu, Indonesia

It is a fact that the Indonesian Muslim youth played a very significant role in the social movement in Indonesia. Therefore, the main purpose of this paper is to discuss the development of the Muslim youth contribution in terms of Indonesian integrity: present the Muslim youth contribution both in the reform of Islamic education and development of rational thinking from traditional to modern ways; and offer some solutions on how to strengthen the Muslim professionalism of youth leadership using three approaches: caricature approach, consultative approach, and advocative approach. Based on the development of the youth movement in terms of national integrity in Indonesia, it can be shown that there is quite a difference between the youth leadership before and after the reformation era. The former youth leadership was idealistic and wanted to create peace in society, they had one spirit, Indonesian unity, even though they came from different tribes, lived in different islands, spoke different languages, and had different religions. Yet, after the reformation era, it seems that the youth leadership, with it's role as an agent of change in our society, has lost the desire to create a peaceful society. It appears that the idealism is gone, and along with it the desire to help the oppressed. This is a current and pressing issue worthy of discussion.

The role of Hizb al-Watan in building a new generation: An analysis of Muhammadiyah and Ikhwan al-Muslimin

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Dr. Noor Shakirah Mat Akhir, School of Humanities, Universiti Sains Malaysia.
